As we move forward with the proposed significant renovation of our current layout in partnership with W&L, we take a brief look at Lexington Golf and Country Club's history.

Lexington Country Club, the second oldest club in Virginia, was constructed by charter members in 1902. The original course was a six-hole layout built on what is now Fairwinds Subdivision between Lime Kiln and Borden Roads. A two-story clubhouse was located on Reid Street. The bottom floor provided lockers for members to store their clubs and golf clothes. The upper floor was the residence for the greenskeeper and his family. The only amenities for the members were a privy behind the clubhouse and a water pipe attached to the clubhouse for a drink of water.

Later the course was expanded to nine holes, and sand bunkers were added. In 1915 the club had 33 members who originally paid membership dues of \$1.25 a month. Later this was raised to \$2.00 a month to cover the rising cost for maintenance of the course. In 1916 the cost of upkeep was \$700. Caddies were paid ten cents for a nine-hole loop. Caddies got Sunday off as golf was "outlawed" on the Sabbath. Sorry Mort!

In 1930 the members decided they had outgrown the original course. M.W. Paxton, Crim Peck, and B.D. Mayo were instrumental in securing 160 acres west of town, the current site. A nine-hole course was open for play in April of 1932.

Many fine players developed their skills on the new layout. Among them were M.W. Paxton, Crim Peck, Cy Twombly, George Macheras, and Blair Nicely. Both Twombly and Nicely held the course record of 63 (2 trips around the course).

In the 1930s and '40s, many of the top names in the entertainment industry stopped in Lexington for performances. Among them were Frank Sinatra, Big Band Leaders Tommy Dorsey, Glen Miller, and many others. Their visits led to "Celebrity Matches" at LGCC. One of the first matches consisted of local standout Cy Twombly, Glen Miller, and Sam Snead. Snead did the unthinkable that day and reached "the unreachable," 575 yard #6 in two.

With the golf boom of the '60s in full swing, it was decided to expand the course to 18 holes. Led by Claude "Red" Patton, the club hired renowned architect Ellis Maples for the renovation. Maples is credited with designing over seventy courses throughout the southeast, including Pinehurst #5, CC of North Carolina, and Grandfather Mountain Golf Course. Maples' associate, Ed Seay, was on-site from start to finish. After ending his time with Maples, Seay became Head Architect for Arnold Palmer's Course Design Company.

Construction on the new 18 holes began in the fall of 1969 and was open for play in April of 1971, a superb layout nicknamed "The Jewel of the Valley."

A number of Lexington Golfers have won State Championships:

- M.W. Paxton won the State Match Play Championship in 1916 at Roanoke CC and then won again in 1917 held at the Lexington Course
- Crim Peck won the State Amateur in 1923
- Mrs. J.W. Zimmerman won the Women's State in 1922
- Blair Nicely captured the State Sr. Championship in 1982 (Blair also won the LGCC Club Championship 19 times.)
- Lexington High School won back-to-back Men's AA State Titles in 1975 & 1976
 - 1975 Team David Brogan, Chip King, Stuart Brewbaker, and Brian Brewbaker
 - 1976 Team Brogan, Brewbaker Brothers, and Barry Mutispaugh, with Brogan as the overall Medalist

No history of LGCC would be complete unless we mentioned the Smith brothers: Harry Lee, Grover, Carl, and Deanie. They all began caddying by the time they were ten years old. Over the years, the brothers performed almost every task imaginable. Between the four of them, they combined over 150 years of service to the club. Quoting one member, "We just couldn't get along without the Smith brothers."

LGCC is a special place. We are fortunate to have such a fine facility with all the amenities one could ask for. Here's to another great season at "The Jewel of The Valley."

Thank you to Alex Macheras and David Woody for their invaluable insights and recollections for this article. (They know where all the bodies are buried.)

Course Update:

The LGCC maintenance team has been hard at work this past month! The team has been able to begin and complete a multitude of projects around the course and are excited to continue that trend into the Summer.

The LGCC maintenance team is pleased to announce the greens have fully healed from aerification conducted at the early part of April. The team was thrilled with the outcome of the process and hope to get the ball rolling smooth and true very soon.

As some of you may have noticed, there are a few pieces of new equipment roaming around the course now! The heavy roller, which has been much needed, is out and rolling the greens a few times a week now. This will increase the playability from a putting standpoint, improving both the roll out and smoothness of the playing surface.

The golf course had pre-emergent herbicide applied to fairways, tees, green surrounds and rough during the middle part of April. This application will hopefully help with the infestation of goose and crabgrass the club has experienced in the past.

The LGCC maintenance team will continue to work hard in order to provide you, the members, with the best possible playing conditions in the Valley!

Superintendent's Corner:

This months Superintendent's Corner will focus on the importance and ways to fix balls marks. With play about to see an uptick in play, the importance of repairing ball marks becomes paramount for groups playing on greens after your group finishes putting. I have attached an article from the USGA.

As golfers, a small amount of our time and attention can go a long way in helping to maintain highquality playing conditions on the courses we play. Repairing ball marks on the putting greens is an easy way to make a positive impact, but the importance of ball mark repair and the proper tools and technique are often misunderstood. Here are five things every golfer should know about repairing ball marks:

1. The proper technique for ball mark repair is easy and fast.

Insert the ball mark repair tool behind the ball mark and gently pull the top of the tool toward the center. Continue working around the ball mark, pulling the surrounding turf in toward the center of the indentation. Avoid using a lifting or twisting motion because this can damage turf roots. Once you have finished pulling turf in toward the center, gently tamp the area down with your putter to create a smooth, firm surface.

2. Unrepaired ball marks cause lasting problems

Failing to repair a ball mark may seem like a minor oversight, but there are lasting consequences. Unrepaired ball marks can take weeks to heal, during which time they can cause balls to bounce off line. The damage to the putting surface is also an entry point for weeds that can cause serious problems.

3. Certain putting greens are more vulnerable to ball marks than others.

Any putting green that typically receives high, lofted approach shots will be more susceptible to ball marks. The putting greens on par-3 holes are a perfect example. If you recognize that a putting green is prone to damage from ball marks, it is important to be mindful of repairing your own ball mark and a few unrepaired ones nearby.

4. Soft conditions mean more ball marks.

When putting greens are wet or soft, ball marks will be more of an issue. This is just one of the reasons why superintendents work hard to promote firm playing conditions with aeration, topdressing and other maintenance practices. If excessive thatch accumulates beneath the putting surface, ball marks and other turf issues will be more problematic.

5. Almost any pointed tool can be used to successfully repair a ball mark.

Many different tools have been created to repair ball marks, including single-pronged and fork-shaped tools. Almost any pointed tool, including a golf tee, can be used to effectively repair a ball mark. Using the proper technique is the key to success.

Playing in an invitational is a great opportunity to meet golfers from other clubs and experience the challenges and beauty of other courses. It is always fun.

If you are interested in playing other courses, meeting other players, and facing new challenges pay attention to the notices that Suzanne Williams sends out about Invitationals.
